



A brief history of Scouting

Scouting began in 1907 and was founded by Robert Baden-Powell, a lieutenant-general in the British Army, serving from 1876 until 1902 in India and Africa.

In 1899, during the Second Boer War in South Africa, Baden-Powell successfully defended the town of Mafeking in a siege that lasted seven months. Baden-Powell's troops were vastly outnumbered so he used local boys to administer first aid, carry messages and run errands.

On returning to the UK, Baden-Powell realised that boys at home could benefit from similar sorts of activities to the boys at Mafeking. These activities went on to form the basis of the Scouting Movement.

While Scouting remains relevant, educational and exciting today, it has not strayed too far from its roots; outdoor adventure, helping others and Scouting skills remain the most iconic of its activities



Milestones of Scouting

Over the years since our foundation we have constantly had to adapt to meet the needs of society and our young people.

1907

Baden-Powell (B-P) runs an experimental camp for 20 boys, from different backgrounds, on Brownsea Island in Dorset, based on the ideas he had begun to formulate.

1908

B-P writes his ideas in a book titled Scouting for Boys (one of the top 10 best-selling books of the 20th century). Scouting took on a life of its own as groups of boys across the country began to organise themselves into Patrols, using B-P's book as the basis for camps and activities, and persuading adults to become their leaders. B-P introduced the motto "Be Prepared" (based on his initials) which is still the Scout motto today.

1912

The Boy Scout Association is incorporated by Royal Charter, granted by King George V.

1916

Wolf Cubs begins for younger brothers who want to get involved. Many years later it would be renamed Cub Scouts.

1918

Rover Scouting begins for young men from 17-25 years old.

1963

The first Little Brothers groups started up in Northern Ireland, they would later go on to become Beaver Scouts.

1966

A report is published recommending the biggest shake-up of Scouting since it began.

1967

Rover Scouts and Senior Scouts amalgamated into a single section called Venture Scouts.

1976

Girls are admitted into Venture Scouts.

1986

Beaver Scouts officially became part of The Scout Association.

1991

The decision is taken to allow girls to become members of all sections.

2002

Venture Scouts replaced by Explorer Scouts and the Scout Network. The Balanced Programme is introduced.

2007

The Scout Association celebrates the centenary of Scouting.

2009

Bear Grylls appointed Chief Scout.

Impressive Scene.

The funerals of the three victims of the explosion took place at Pitsea Church yard on Wednesday, when there was a very impressive and moving scene. The three graves, side by side were in nearly the centre of the Anglican portion of the new graveyard, in line with the south door of the church. There was a congregation of over 500 people. Numerous relatives and friends of the deceased attended as mourners, the factory proprietors and staff were well represented, and in addition to the many from the village and places near, there were present post men under Mr Cook, postmaster of Pitsea, police under Sergeant. Coe, members of the Buffalo Lodge in regalia, and boy Scouts, etc.

A contingent of the Boy Scouts bought up the rear. In the church yard the 1st Vange Boy Scouts under Scoutmaster Western, were drawn up as a guard of honour.


an angel might envy.



Scouts and Guides face headquarters eviction threat

Bazaar for a new home

Faced with the threat that within the next few years they will have to leave their headquarters In Riverton Drive, Vange, to make way for New town developments, the 1st Pitsea and Vange Group of Scouts and Guides are setting about the task of raising money to build a new headquarters.

The ball was set rolling on Saturday when they raised about £67 towards the project at a Christ-mas bazaar at Riverton Drive. And there was a celebrity to open the event—Billericay's M.P. Mr Edward

Gardner, Q.C., who brought with him his children Sally (seven) and Stephen (four).

Mr. Gardner, who was introduced by Mr F. M. Meldrum, Deputy Chairman of the Group said, "The

Target is £100 and the money is for a very worth-while cause, for it is to be used for the very best of purposes in ensuring the successful future of the Group.

"It is hoped that eventually the Group will be able to build a new hall to replace this building, which

was originally erected by local Scouts and Guides before the war. You want a new headquarters to match the new community which is springing up around you".

Riverton Hall was built by voluntary labour in 1924 and has been used ever since by the 1st Pitsea and Vange Group, one of the oldest groups in the district.

Among those present at Saturdays bazaar were the District Commissioner for Scouts, Mr E. C. Jeff, Mrs I Kefford District Commissioner for Guides, the Chairman of the Basildon and District Local Association of Boy Scouts, Mr R. Anderson and the Chairman of the 1st and Vange Group, Mr E Dines.

The hall was gaily decorated and most of the articles for sale were made either by members of the group or their parents.









SCOUT'S PROBLEM MAY BE SOLVED

The problem of finding a temporary home for Pitsea and Vange Scout Group, who are soon to loose their 30 year old Headquarters, looks as though it has been solved.

The Basildon Local Association of Scouts are negotiating with Basildon Corporation to take over the Old postal sorting office in Timberlog Lane, Basildon. Local Association Chairman Mr Derek Spurging told the "Standard" this week: "The old sorting office has been promised to us, but at the moment negotiations have not been completed—there are a number of ends that still need tying up."

The Group have met for about 30 years in the Scout Hut in Riverton Drive, Vange, but while they are in an unique position of owning their own ground and Headquarters, the land is required for redevelopment by Basildon Corporation.

Commented Mr Spurging: "There is no hurry to vacate the Riverton Drive premises at the present, but the Group will have to do so eventually. We hope to build a new Headquarters for them on a new site we have obtained in Weavers, Vange. This proposed new Headquarters, which will be the only Head quarters to be shared jointly by Scouts and Guides, is scheduled for 1965 or 1966. Mean while, the sorting office would be an ideal place for them to meet.

The Association area little worried about the damage that has been caused to the sorting office since It has been empty.

Said Mr Spurging: "The extent of the damage, I believe, is estimated at £80. While we could not afford to replace all it's broken windows, we think we could fix some of the damage.






