Before it goes elsewhere?


So best not be away too long

We were invited to hold a display at Vange Church on the 7th-8th September. The photographs were on the old buildings of Basildon.

During Septempter and early October we also had displays on Wickford Churches and Sounds of Basildon at St Andrews and St Catherines.



Pitsea & Vange Library Presentations.

Since our last newsletter, we have reviewed and expanded our topic presentation skills to include "Audio Voiceovers" and 'Podcasts' in order that presentations can be made to a wider audience and society, without necessarily our attendance.

Firstly, our contact with regard to Pitsea and now Vange Library service, by request of the librarian, to host a series of sessions directly relating to Family and Social History research, these have also been recorded onto our Basildon Heritage 'You Tube' site including –

10th Aug 2024 – Session No.3 – A 'Live' Case Study (by agreement with the person with the person for whom we are researching his family history and who helped audience participation.

7th Sept 2024 – Session No.4 – The Evolution of Genealogy. (How history has played a major part in creating obstacles for researchers.



Not video recorded:

04th Oct 2024 – Session No. 5 – The History of Genealogy. (A retrospect of the demographic movement of peoples.)

02nd Nov 2024 – Session No. 6 (The last in the series) – Researching the British Armed Forces.

All of these lectures are on a Saturday afternoon at the Vange Library.

We have already been asked by the library to prepare a programme for next year, albeit this may well be with a different format as we also have learned from those attending of the differing levels of research knowledge they bring or wish to pursue.

The individual topics, now under discussion, some which could include:

A Walk across the Thames. Air Raid Shelters. Animals that served in the First World War. British Actors who served in the Second World War. British Entertainers who served in the Second World War. Evacuation in World War Two. Famous London Pubs. Ley Lines. Livery Companies and Pub Signs. London Prisons. The Battle of Benfleet. The Explosives Trail (At Wat Tyler Country Park). The Stagecoach. Women's Land Army and Workhouses.

Remembrance Comemoration

On Saturday the 9th November we held a short remembrance service with the Basildon Twinning Association at the Empty Chair just outside the Green Centre. Then a number of us were involved with remembrance day services at various locatons on the Sunday.



On Monday 11th we gave a talk to Fairhouse School explaining the meaning of remembrance day and how the poppy became a remembrance symbol, followed on what the basildon area was like during wartimes.

Overseas Friends – California Dreamin'

We continue to join in the weekly Zoom meetings with both Santa Barbara and Ventura County Genealogical Society groups, being asked to give various lectures from our ever-increasing library of historical information as well as having one-to-one contact with their members who ask for our help and knowledge of their own family ancestors who came from Britain.

What is appreciated is that when they also have visitors to their advertised zoom meetings from other widespread locations in America, we are introduced personally as being their out based members from

'across the pond' from Basildon in Essex, with the implied knowledge of their histories.

The most recent deliveries to the Ventura society have been on:

11th Sep 2024 – Chief Joseph Brant – The Mohawk Nation on the side of the British during the Wars of Independence (Part 1).

16th Oct 2024 - The London Beer Flood of 1814.

11th Dec 2024 – Chief Joseph Brant – (Part 2) – His meetings in Britain with King George III and with British social society in this country.

- 14th November 1770 – Scottish explorer James Bruce discovered the source of the Blue Nile.


- 14th November – The British Broadcasting Company began daily transmissions. At 6pm the news was read by Arthur Burrows.

This book tells the story of how Basildon New Town was built and the challenges faced, not only by the Development Corporation, but also by its existing and new inhabitants. It covers the key events leading up to 1949, housing construction, the town centre, industry, art, architecture and people".

Facts about August:


- August was named after Emperor Augustus Caesar in 8AD
