#### Talks/Events/Etc.

## Blue Plaques

Since our last Newsletter in September two more Blue Plaques have been unveiled in the Borough.

**Stan Hollands** – The plaque was unveiled by Rod Cole (Environmentalist) on Wednesday 3<sup>rd</sup> December 2025 at the 'Essex Wildlife' site just off the Dunton Road.

Stan was born in Langdon Hills. He was a man brought up in a Christian tradition which generated a strong moral conviction, and a powerful sense of loyalty – to his churches (Langdon Hills Methodist and Dry Street Memorial), his friends, his cricket club (Westley) and, not least, to his Langdon Hills and Laindon origins.



**Elsie Lagsding** – This plaque was unveiled by the Lord Lieutenant of Essex, Jennifer Tolhurst on the 6<sup>th</sup> December with the Mayor of Basildon and other dignitaries in attendance at the Benbow Club Bowers Gifford.



Elsie was an unsung heroine in the fight for votes for women. She lived in Clarence Road, Bowers Gifford. Our thanks go to the Benbow Staff for helping to organize the event.

### Overseas Friends

As we continue to work with a number of overseas Genealogical Societies perhaps you would not be surprised that we get even more “word of mouth” enquiries for help in tracing ancestors that link to Britain in general, and occasionally from our Borough as with the most recent enquiry from the Parish of Venray in the Limburg Region of the Netherlands.

They, similar to (SLO) Stichting Luchtoorlog Onderzoek, Drenthe, a Dutch foundation for air war research in Drenthe province during World War II, regularly maintain, with photographs and special occasions, including Christmas, with candles at the headstones of those Royal Air Force Crews who lost their lives, in combat during the Second World War, over the Limburg region.

### Germany

We continue our friendship and dialogue with Herr Lehniger (Schulleiter – Head Teacher) of GSG (Geschwister Schol Gymnasium) in Aachen by including him in the recipients of our research booklets and power point presentations which he then passes to his English Language class tutors.

Also, I should mention of the links built up by the Basildon Twinning Association with whom we are directly involved, and visiting programme, both ways, continue with Heiligenhaus with whom, of course, Basildon is formally twinned.

### California

We have expanded our links with a third county in California, already well established with Santa Barbara and Ventura, now South Orange County have linked up with us, to a point we have planned weekly ‘Zoom’ meetings to cover both individual family and social research as well as presenting lectures through the same medium.

### The Current Programme includes:

For South Orange County on Monday 12 January 2026, a lecture given on the Workhouses of England and that talk will be repeated for Ventura County on 11 February and they have also requested other lectures including London Prisons (which of course includes people (convicts?) who were transported to the Americas (John Harvard of University fame being one such)).

We are currently working with seven individual members from the three California societies and are never ceased to be amazed at the historic and social links generated with their research. Most definitely something they can 'dine out on'.

## Australia

We regularly exchange Newsletters with the Redland Genealogical Society in Cleveland Queensland Australia and of course have occasional requests for help from their members. We have in the recent past had some of their members visit us here at the Green Centre.

We have met with John Smith who has started a U3A Group on Family History for Canvey Island (an initial project booking at the War Memorial Hall on Canvey) and have attended one of their meetings with offers of inclusion on our planned programme above. He will circulate our programme and has indicated that he, and possibly others in his group, may attend here at the Green Centre.

In similar vein, Emma Hale, Volunteering and Skills Coordinator for Tilbury on Thames Trust has contacted us about the project in Tilbury to restore the Grade II\* listed Riverside Station. They are engaging volunteers as community researchers and are collaborating with the National Archives and Essex Record Office and providing training by the Oral History Society.

We have, of course, volunteers who have practical knowledge of that environment, including both the social, wartime, rail and embarkation structures, and I will reply to invite her to come and meet us to establish how such collaboration can help.

## Social Media

Basildon Heritage are actively using various social media channels, namely, Facebook, Instagram and YouTube. Facebook is our most active channel with close to 14,000 Followers and a twice daily posting regime by members.

Instagram and YouTube are more recent ventures and are building Followers and Subscriptions at a steady rate.

Our website, [www.basildonheritage.org.uk](http://www.basildonheritage.org.uk) is the backbone for the society and receives steady updates and improvements. We are trialing an online shop linked to the website called Kofi.

Our digitisation department continues its work on bound newspapers, press and donated photos and more recently, specialised maps and plans related to the Borough.

Educational Resources (website section) continues to develop with a potentially valuable resource for local schools and teachers.

The society continues to protect its digital assets with more robust on-premise storage and Cloud storage via the Google eco system.

Thanks to a grant by the Basildon Area Committees, we now have a high-performance server with dual screens to assist with our administration, communications and on-site storage, this should be operational this month.

We also have, as a result of the grant, a public facing computer which will be used to store our digital newspapers and photo archives and allow on site viewing for visitors.

A second large screen computer and two photo scanners (one large flatbed and one auto feed) is also up and running for volunteers to continue the digitisation work.

The society are custodians for a large collection of water colour paintings by Alan Jagger. Our future plans are to display his works (which are for sale) on our website or a similar platform. Part of this collection is currently on show at our sister New Town of Harlow at the Gibberd Gallery.

As Spring approaches, we will start to re-engage on a project called Basildon Now. This project is recording the town in all aspects over the period 2025/6 by way of drive-through videos, (on our YouTube channel), drone videos, and buildings of the era by our volunteers.

This will time stamp our recordings for future generations.

Volunteer education in various IT skills continues, Adobe Acrobat, Google eco system, scanning, IT security and efficient use of our assets and software are either in play or planned. This is an important part of making our valuable volunteers both efficient and to create value in the role for them.
